The Trust's Aims and Objectives

The main aim of the Trust is to support Christian ministry in Romania. The chief points of contact are the Hungarian Baptist Churches in Brasov and Mures county, and the FAST charity in the Brasov area.

A subsidiary aim is to provide assistance to the Brasov Children's Hospital and in pre-school work in deprived communities.

In the U.K. the objective of the Trust is to provide an effective channel for churches, schools and individual supporters to assist Christian work in Romania. The Trust also seeks to facilitate cooperation between British charities and missions working in Romania

Our Policies

We pray for God's guidance in all the decision making that is necessary and all but the most minor decisions are made at regular Trustees' meetings.

Unless answering a specific request from Romania, we only send items that we are offered after checking that they will be useful. We only send items that are 'in date', we comply with Romanian regulations, and we do not allow aid items to be sold in Romania. We have no wish to hinder the fragile growth of the Romanian economy, so where practical we provide cash for local purchase of items and labour.

We do not support projects where progress cannot be monitored satisfactorily.

New trustees are invited and appointed by the whole body of existing Trustees.

Trustees

There were two Trustees' business meetings during the year. At each meeting reports were received on the financial situation and on progress with projects in Romania. At each meeting Trustees review the budget for the rolling next 12 months.

Detailed reports of each of the two visits to Romania that took place during the year were discussed. Most Trustees made at least one visit to Romania during the year, and took the opportunity to invite other supporters to view projects.

Trustees considered a range of requests for assistance and made appropriate allocations of funds.

The Trustees reviewed the Risk Assessment and concluded that satisfactory measures are taken to limit risks.

The Trust's commitments in relation to its income were studied, and it was considered that all current commitments could be met from current levels of income, with a reasonable reserve.

The split of expenditure between 'secular' (e.g. medical aid) and 'spiritual' (e.g. church planting) projects was kept under review. The existing division of approximately 25/75 should be maintained.

The Trust meets the 'public benefit' requirements of charity registration, as there are no restrictions on whom may join the supported churches or be treated at the Children's Hospital.

A sub-committee of Trustees was formed to handle the Trust's interests in cases of misappropriation of funds in Romania.

Achievements

Help for the Brasov Children's Hospital was mainly quarterly shipments of antibiotics and asthma supplies. Following the collapse of state funding for hospitals in Romania it has become clear that the Trust's contribution now accounts for 33% of the hospital's medicine needs.

General aid items shipped included: new clothes, craft and stationery items, (mainly for Christian Camps and Sunday Schools), toys (new & second-hand) for the Hospital and kindergartens.

Christian ministry in Mures County has continued to receive support, with help for purchase, renovation and construction of buildings, and payment of pastors' allowances. Help has continued with materials for the increasing Christian work amongst children in a number of villages.

Trust supporters continue to give supplements to their pension to a number of poor widows and some families.

The relationship with the locally registered FAST charity, working with deprived people in the Brasov area, continued. FAST UK is now established as a registered UK charity, thus freeing the Trust from its role as UK liaison for FAST, although some donations destined for FAST UK are still received by the Trust.

Key features from the Accounts

- Income from donations was maintained in spite of the recession.
- Income from sales of DVDs that we have produced for schools contin-

ues to be useful.

- Administration costs (shown in the accounts as 'Governance') at 5% of income, were higher than usual due to the inclusion of the costs of a special visit by three Trustees. Some costs are borne by Cleaford Services Ltd which is itself feeling the results of the recession.

The Year Ahead

Trustees and supporters will be visiting Romania to review our projects and to encourage those doing the work. These visits are also valuable in informing UK churches and other supporters of the continuing needs. We must emphasise wherever possible that Romania's membership of the EU has not relieved the poverty experienced by a very large proportion of the population.

Thanks to...

We benefited from yet another year of free use of storage and packing space in Crondall, which has been much appreciated.

Countless people have kept up the supply of new clothes, toys, school items and other useful materials. Many will feel that they are only giving in a small way, but they have aggregated into significant and encouraging quantities.

InKind Direct's arrangement for us to link with the Disney store in Reading has been most successful, with the Trust receiving substantial supplies of toys and gifts at a nominal charge. The Children's Hospital, in particular, are very grateful for these toys and dressing up clothes.

We thank many churches, fellowships (often including Women's Groups, etc. affiliated to a church) and schools for their support in various ways. It is not possible to list them all.

In addition to financial help, and gifts in kind, we thank those churches that have invited us to preach (and have often made donations to the work).

'School' help often includes parents who make gifts or buy DVDs, or donate goods and harvest and Christmas offerings. We also thank teachers and office staff who administer!

There are too many other individuals and organisations to list, but we acknowledge our dependence on the continuing support of a growing band of friends of the needy people of Romania, young and old alike. Continuity is important, and we acknowledge many who have quietly continued with us over the years.

RIAC

The Trust, as part of its ministry to the needy of Romania, provides a substitute service in place of the old Southampton Romania Information Centre, under the title of Romania Information At Cleaford (RIAC). Our Directory of groups working in Romania, which is on the Internet at www.riac.org.uk, is widely used, as is the free RIAC email news service which Phil Dunford runs under the RIAC title. The idea has been picked up in Basov, where there is a similar network, known as CAN.

How you can help...

The Trustees welcome **prayer support**. Decisions have to be made regarding requests received from Roma-

nia, and we need to know God's will in each case. We also need wisdom, and imagination, when considering the best approach to follow when seeking to meet a request.

Please **pray for our partners** in Romania, including:

As senior pastors retire younger men, usually with young families, are taking responsibility for groups of churches. We should pray for wisdom and energy, and for good time management to protect against 'burn-out'.

Pray for Dr. Mazgareanu, the Medical Director, management and staff at the Brasov Children's Hospital, as they continue to work under budget pressures and uncertainty, and are discouraged by the lack of local support. They continue to need the courage to stand against corruption and to staff the hospital where wages are very poor. Dr Mazgareanu is expected to retire soon, and so we pray for a successor with his wisdom, patience and good humour.

Pray for the families working on the construction, or receiving the benefit of, the Better Homes. We praise God for the encouragement this project has given to many people who have been otherwise rejected.

Pray for Daniel and Ema Hristea and their team at FAST. Working in the very poor communities calls for wisdom, courage, discernment and much energy. They need particular wisdom in dealing with local politics and corruption pressures.

Pray for the ministry at Harghita Christian Camp, where many children, young people, disabled and adults hear the gospel every summer.

The Trust is always in need of **cash gifts**, either for grants to our Romanian partners, or for the purchase of items not otherwise available.

Please think whether you can arrange a **fund-raising event** in aid of the Trust's work. We have supporters who have planned concerts for us, send us money from friends parking their caravan on their land or from their hens laying eggs! Perhaps there are other ideas. We are always keen to supply photo displays, videos and speakers for events in aid of the Trust.

Please **pray** for Trustees as they preach, lead school assemblies, and speak to a range of different groups. We seek to glorify God, tell the gospel with a smile, and raise awareness of how the gospel can be put into practice in service to the needy.

We welcome **invitations** to schools and churches, to preach or lead, particularly All-age worship services.

Please consider whether you could **invite a Trust speaker** to your group.

Do you have connections with a **school** that could use our DVD scheme?

We are grateful for supporters who keep up a regular stream of small gifts of **pencils, felt tips, paint brushes and the like**. We are now aiming to provide these and other craft materials for about 250 children in hospital, over 400 children in Sunday Schools and over 600 attending summer camps!

Each year the Hospital has 200/250 children there at Christmas, many of whom would not get a present unless it comes from us. We send suitable **toys, games,**

etc through the year. If you would like to help in this way please observe the following -

- Do not wrap them
- No toys that require batteries
- Games and puzzles need to be complete
- Colouring books, etc should not be part used
- None of the ghoulish figures that seem fashionable in UK at present
- Soft toys, etc need to be clean

We have also had a special request from the hospital for Christmas decorations to brighten up the building, and for baby clothes, such as rompers, that are not knitted.

Misappropriation of Funds

In February 2012 it became clear that funds we had been sending for a number of years, designated for distribution to widows and poor families in the Brasov church, had not been passed on by the minister with whom the scheme had been established. (He subsequently moved to another post.) Of a total of about £17,000 he has returned about £13,000, and this is now being used for the purpose for which it was intended.

In March 2012 we became aware that there were suspicions amongst members of the Executive of the Convention of Hungarian Baptist Churches in Romania that another minister, who at various times had been President or a Vice-president of the Convention, might also have misappropriated funds that we had sent to him for various specific purposes. From our records we were able to give the Executive details of amounts and designations of funds we had sent over a prolonged period, and their investigations

established that this man had misappropriated approximately £80,000. It also transpired that he and his wife had requested funds for items that were already funded from elsewhere.

For many years teams of Trustees have visited the churches in Romania at least twice a year. On each occasion there has been a business meeting with this couple at which needs have been discussed. Building projects have been visited and the results inspected. When carrying out their annual risk assessment the Trustees had concluded that the following factors indicated very low risk:-

1. Dealing with senior ministers in a mainstream Christian denomination
2. Twice annual visits by groups of Trustees
3. Inspections of items built or purchased with Trust funds
4. Other reputable charities in the UK and USA were also providing assistance.

It became clear that other serious financial irregularities, in areas with which the Trust was not directly connected, had been perpetrated by these two ministers (who are brothers), and it became evident that they had successfully hidden their activities from their own close colleagues for a number of years.

Trustees have had protracted negotiations with the Executive regarding recovery of the missing funds, and they have now accepted that they should take a proactive role in recovery. At the same time the Executive is looking to recover some of their own losses from one of the brothers.

The Trust has tabled a repayment schedule on the basis of monthly payments over a period of 36 months and, at the time of writing, negotiations continue.

Trustees have held a number of meetings with church officials in Romania, and have established the following procedures for the future:-

1. Where it is unavoidable to pass funds to a 'middleman' (e.g. for a poor beneficiary with no bank access) at least two responsible people will be advised of the transaction, and confirmation of receipt will be required.
2. Where possible there will no longer be monthly transfers for widows and families. A 'hardship' fund for particular needs will be established, administered by a church committee, whose records the Trust will inspect.
3. To avoid the complications of 'salaries', any support for ministers will be in the form of an allowance (for rent, travel, etc), and such payments will be made directly to the individual, with a notification sent to the Executive.
4. Where money is sent for local purchases the Trust will inspect receipts.

Once the problems came to light no more transfers were made for any purpose for which there was doubt. Funds received from supporters for these purposes have been held in the Trust's UK account.

In order to put this issue into context it is noted that during the 18 completed financial years that the Trust has operated £917,143 has been received as cash income. Of this, approximately £670,000 has been transferred to Romania.

Financial Statements

Report of the Trustees

The Trustees submit their report on the accounts of the Trust for the year ended 30th June 2012.

Principal activities

1. The Trust was created by Deed on 6th July 1994 and is exclusively for charitable purposes
2. There has been no change in the constitution of the Trust since its creation, and it is registered as a charity in accordance with the Charities Act 2011
3. Trustees serving throughout the year were A.R. Cleaver, P.J. Dunford, L.J. Dunford RGN, P.M. Guy, R.E. Guy, A.P. Henderson, Rev'd. D. Pritchard, L.M. Barnardo and S.M. Cleaver.
4. The Trustees in respect of the year to 30th June 2012 have distributed in grants and donations a total of £ 40,254 (2011—£95,343) in furtherance of the Trust's objectives.

Statement of Trustees' responsibilities

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' report and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Charity law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial period which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Fund's financial activities during the year and of its financial position at the end of the year. In preparing those financial statements the Trustees are required to:

select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;

observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;

make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;

prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Trust will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Fund and which enable them to ascertain the financial position of the Fund and to ensure that the accounts comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 and the provisions of the trust deed. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Fund and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The Trustees review the charity's commitments in relation to its income, with the intention that all current commitments can be met from current levels of income. They also make an annual review of risks to which they believe the charity is exposed.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees is undertaken by the chairman, in consultation with existing Trustees.

The Trustees carry out an annual Risk Review, in the light of which reserves are also reviewed, and are intended to provide for at least 6 months' commitments following a catastrophic loss of regular income. During this period efforts would be made to replace the lost income.

The Trustees review the charity's finances at each meeting, and concluded that the position at the end of the financial year was satisfactory, and exceeded their longer term forecasts. .

During the previous year a FAST UK charity was registered. It was the intention of the trustees of both charities that from 1st July 2011 income for FAST from UK supporters should no longer be handled by the Trust, however some donors had not transferred their standing orders to FAST UK during the current year.

During the accounting period the Trustees became aware that not all the financial support for widows' pensions, pastors' salaries and other designated projects had reached its intended final recipient. This had been the case for a number of years and the aggregate sum involved is approximately £93,000. The Trustees have notified the Charity Commission, the Independent Examiner and the Trust's donors. The Trustees are making strenuous efforts to recover the sums involved so that they may be applied appropriately. To date approximately £13,000 has been recovered and is being held in Romania awaiting further instructions from the Trustees. Steps have also been taken to change the arrangements for local distribution of funds which are sent to Romania.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of The Cleaford Christian Trust

I report on the accounts of The Cleaford Christian Trust for the year ended 30 June 2012, which are set out on pages 10 to 16.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's Trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act) and that an independent examination is needed.

It is my responsibility to:

- examine the accounts under section 145 of the 2011 Act;
- to follow the procedures laid down in the General Directions given by the Charity Commissioner under section 145(5)(b) of the 2011 Act; and
- to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's report

My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commissioner. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and the seeking of explanations from you as Trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit and, consequently no opinion is given as to whether the accounts present a 'true and fair view' and the report is limited to those matters set out in the statement below.

Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements are prepared on the receipts and payments basis and in accordance with applicable law, the Charities Act 2011 and SORP 2005 Accounting & Reporting by Charities.

Donations

Donations represent amounts received during the period.

Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees for furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by the donor or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes.

Incoming Resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of financial activities when the charity becomes legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy..

Voluntary income consists of donations and is accounted for on a receipts basis.

Resources Expended

Expenditure is accounted for on a payments basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all the costs related to that heading.

Direct charitable expenditure consists of costs incurred attributable to specific activities.

Costs of generating funds are those incurred in seeking voluntary contributions.

Governance costs are those costs incurred in connection with the administration of the charity and compliance with statutory requirements.

Payments totalling £197 have been made to Cleaford Services Ltd for goods and services provided. Cleaford Services Ltd is owned by Mr Angus Cleaver and Mr Philip Dunford, who are Trustees, and Mrs Sheena Cleaver and Mrs Jan Dunford (their wives) are also Trustees.

No remuneration has been paid to Trustees. Three Trustees were reimbursed for the costs of travel, for a total of £914.38, for an exceptional visit to Romania in connection with the recovery of misappropriated funds.

Capitalisation policy

All assets and maintenance costs are written-off in the year of purchase.

The General reserve represents the free funds of the charity which are not designated for particular purposes.

The Camp fund represents support for the Harghita Christian Camp, mainly by settlement of their gas bill.

The Children's Hospital fund represents support designated for the Brasov Children's Hospital.

The Salaries Fund represents donations received for the support of salaries of pastors and church workers.

The Kindergarten Fund is designated for kindergarten support in Tarlungeni village.

The Widows Fund represents funds donated for the payment of supplementary pensions to poor widows in Romania, and is allocated on the recommendations of church pastors.

The Families fund represents donations designated by supporters for the financial assistance of poor families nominated by church pastors.

The Better Home Project was established in conjunction with the Romanian registered FAST Foundation for the improvement of housing in poor communities in the Brasov area.

Some donations are designated specifically for the use of the Romanian registered FAST Foundation, with whom we work in the Brasov area, and are held in the FAST General Fund. The FAST Child Sponsorship scheme's funds are held separately.

The Building Projects fund represents donations designated for the purchase, construction or alteration of buildings to be used by churches in Mures county.

Following the death of Abigail Cleaver a fund was established for a memorial church building in Peris, Romania. Expenditure against this fund is included in Building Projects.
